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## Navigating the Journey of Grief - Bereavement Support at the RHN

The journey of grieving begins, for most RHN families and friends, long before the death of their loved one. The acquired brain injury or neurological diseases that affect most of our patients mean that, whilst they are still physically present in their loved ones lives, much of whom they were before their illness has been lost. This loss leads to an experience of grief for their loved ones, and this grieving goes on for the many years that the patient is living with us.

When a patient does die after a long term brain injury or illness the process of grieving is complex and challenging. There are many reasons for this, including the working through of all of the feelings from years of ambiguous loss, the grieving for the loss of the "new" person that family and friends have got to know since the injury or illness, the sudden absence of a familiar routine, and anxious thoughts about the future. All of this can create a profound sense of emptiness and despair.

In these difficult times, the role of a Bereavement Support Officer becomes invaluable, providing compassionate guidance and practical assistance to navigate the journey of grief.

#### Bereavement Support at the RHN

The Bereavement Support Officer at the RHN offers personalised support to families dealing with loss. They provide a safe space to express emotions and validate experiences, they support families through all of the challenging dynamics and offer practical guidance on navigating the immediate and long-term challenges of grief.

The RHN's current Bereavement Support Officer is Suzy Thomas, a member of our Leisure and Family Services Team, and she works in conjunction with our Chaplaincy team to support the families and friends of the patient who is dying, or has died.

"Because many of our patients are with us for many months or even years before they die, we get to know them and their families very well and that means we are in a position to offer family members very practical and tailored support, understanding and guidance." - Suzy, RHN Bereavement Support Officer.

#### **Benefits of Practical Bereavement Support**

- Emotional Support: Bereavement Support Officers provide a listening ear and empathic understanding, helping families navigate the overwhelming emotions of grief.
- Coping Strategies: They equip families with coping mechanisms to manage the emotional and practical aspects of grief, including stress management, communication skills, and self-care techniques.
- Information and Guidance: They provide comprehensive information about grief, bereavement processes, and available resources, helping families make informed decisions during a vulnerable time.
- Connection and Community: They connect families with support groups and networks, fostering a sense of belonging and shared experiences.
- Long-Term Support: They offer long-term support, recognising that grief is a non-linear journey, and families may need assistance at various stages.

### Building our wildlife friendly credentials

At the RHN we try to provide external memorials that are not only befitting to our supporters and their loved ones but also environmentally friendly. Our lavender memorials support a myriad of bees and butterflies and our memorial trees provide a welcome perch for local birds, squirrels and more.

However, it's now widely recognised that many bird species are in decline due to loss of habitats, pesticide use and climate change. There are simply not enough nesting sites and we certainly noticed a reduction in bird activity last year. In an effort to help our feathered friends; and maintain that all important therapeutic connection to nature for our patients, we have introduced bird boxes to our memorial options.

With the help of volunteers from our corporate supporters, Merkle and Nelsons, we have built a collection of multi species bird boxes. Personalised memorial plaques will be available to purchase and these will be affixed to the bird boxes before they are installed.

What a wonderful, nurturing way to pay tribute to a loved one. A camera will be placed in one of the boxes to stream onto the hospital e-screens for patients, families and staff to enjoy.

#### Christmas Fair


