Conference Chair

Professor Daniel Kelly OBE PhD RN FRCN FRSA

Professor Daniel Kelly is a respected leader in cancer and palliative care research and education, recognised both nationally and internationally. Since 2011, he served as the RCN Chair of Nursing Research at Cardiff University, where he significantly promoted nursing scholarship, research influence, and professional leadership.

Daniel started his clinical journey as a Charge Nurse at the Edinburgh Cancer Centre, gaining essential experience in specialised cancer care. He then moved to the Royal Marsden Hospital, where he taught cancer care and helped develop future professionals before fully shifting to academia. In 2021, he was awarded the OBE for his notable contributions to cancer and palliative care research and education.

He was also elected a Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing in 2016, highlighting his prominent impact. He presently acts as Convenor of the RCN Fellows. Currently, he chairs the Education, Research and End-of-Life Policy Committee at St Christopher's Hospice, where he is a Trustee, and holds Visiting Professorships at the University of Edinburgh, UCL, and Oxford Brookes. In addition to his academic roles, Daniel is Governor at King's College London NHS Foundation Trust, fostering strong links among research, policy, and practice. He is Co-Chair of the European Cancer Organisation HPV Action Network promoting vaccination across Europe to prevent cancers in later life. Residing locally, he continues to support innovation, education, and compassionate care in nursing and care.

Her professional contributions have been acknowledged through national commendations, including recognition in the *Health Service Journal*.
